Clarkson University Achievement Award

This award recognizes a member of the junior class who demonstrates leadership and outstanding academic achievement. This award automatically carries a \$48,000 (\$12,000 per year) tuition scholarship if the recipient chooses to enroll at Clarkson University.

Clarkson University Leadership Award

Victoria Jasinski

This award recognizes a member of the junior class who demonstrates outstanding leadership qualities and is recognized by faculty and students as having been a positive contributor to the school and community. This award automatically carries a \$60,000 (\$15,000 per year) tuition scholarship if the recipient chooses to enroll at Clarkson University.

Elmira College Key

George H. Ball Community Achievement Award

Named after the founder of Keuka College, the Ball Award rewards students based on qualities that embody the values of Keuka College, including: integrity, academic excellence, diversity, leadership, service, and social responsibility. The award grants qualifying students a \$10,000 award or a \$40,000 scholarship over 4 years of study at Keuka College.

Harvard Prize Book Award

Established in 1910 by Harvard Alumni to recognize outstanding students in the next to graduating class who “display excellence in scholarship and high character, combined with achievement in other fields.”

Lawrence Technological University Award for Excellence in Science & Mathematics

Sarah Wegman

This award recognizes a junior who shows excellence in science and mathematics, and who is an active and responsible citizen of the school and community. The Lawrence Tech University Award for Excellence in Science and Mathematics carries an \$8,000 (\$2,000 per year) tuition scholarship towards an undergraduate degree program upon enrollment at Lawrence Tech.

Niagara University – St. Vincent DePaul Medal Scholarship Award

The St. Vincent DePaul Scholarship recognizes extraordinary leadership and service amongst WNY Catholic High School students. This student exhibits compassion for peers, initiative, empathy for those less fortunate, humility, and leadership in the community. The recipient will receive \$1,000 per year upon enrollment to Niagara University.

Rachel Carson Book Award

Chatham University offers the Rachel Carson Book Award for junior students who have shown passion for the environment and interest in writing or the sciences. This junior is receiving a copy of the *Silent Spring* book as well as a \$1,000 scholarship to Chatham University in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, should they choose to attend.

Randolph College Book Award

The Randolph College Book Award is presented to an outstanding junior who demonstrates achievement in academic excellence and leadership potential. The recipient of this award automatically qualifies for a merit scholarship of \$20,000 (\$5,000 per year) if she applies and is accepted for admission to Randolph College. Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute Medal & Scholarship Program

The minimum \$25,000 per year merit scholarship is guaranteed for four years for each Medalist who applies, is accepted, and chooses to enroll at Rensselaer.

Rochester Institute of Technology - Computing Medal & Scholarship Program

Elaina Murphy, Alyssa Weldon

This medal is awarded to two members of the junior class who have distinguished themselves academically, are active and involved members of SHA and the community, and demonstrate interest and ability in computing. This Computer Medal scholarship is valued at \$28,000 (\$7,000 per year) if the recipients are accepted and enrolled at RIT. This scholarship is not limited to a computing-related discipline and may be used to support study in any undergraduate program at RIT.

Rochester Institute of Technology - Innovation and Creativity Award Program

This medal is awarded to two members of the junior class who have distinguished themselves academically, are active and involved members of SHA and the community, and demonstrate interest and ability in innovation, creativity, or entrepreneurship. This Computer Medal scholarship is valued at \$28,000 (\$7,000 per year) if the recipients are accepted and enrolled at RIT. This scholarship is not limited to a computing-related discipline and may be used to support study in any undergraduate program at RIT.

Saint Michael's College Book Award

This award is to recognize a junior who exhibits the characteristics of an ideal Saint Michael's student. This student must demonstrate achievement in academics and illustrate a sustained and sincere commitment to community service activities. This award comes with significant scholarship opportunities to Saint Michael's ranging from \$5,000 to full tuition.
